Subject:	Fire Risk of Electronic Cigarettes in Checked Baggage
Ref. Publications:	International Civil Aviation Organisation (ICAO) Electronic Bulletin (EB) 2014/074 AN 11/2.1 "Dangerous Goods Carried by Passenger and Crew — Incidents Related to Electronic Cigarettes" dated 10 December 2014.
	Addendum No. 1 to ICAO Doc 9284-AN/905, 2015-2016 Edition of the Technical Instructions to the Safe Transport of Dangerous Goods by Air, dated 26 of May 2015 and in force as of 09 June 2015.
I	Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Safety Alert for Operators (SAFO) <u>15003</u> "Fire Risk of Electronic Cigarettes (e-cigarettes) in Checked Baggage" dated 22 January 2015.
Applicability:	All aircraft operators.
Description:	Several incidents were reported to ICAO involving electronic cigarettes (e-cigarettes) overheating by way of their heating element being accidentally activated resulting in a fire in checked baggage.
	ICAO has recently published Addendum No. 1 to the 2015- 2016 Edition of Doc 9284 (Technical Instructions for the Safe Transport of Dangerous Goods By Air), formally addressing the initial recommendation to ICAO Member States contained in EB 2014/074 AN 11/2.1 dated 10 December 2014.
	Addendum No. 1 introduces a new item in Part 8-1 of the Technical Instructions for the Safe Transport of Dangerous Goods: " <i>Battery-powered portable electronic smoking</i> <i>devices</i> ". The provisions for these items are based on the existing provisions for " <i>portable electronic devices</i> " with the added restrictions of requiring passengers to carry battery- powered portable electronic smoking devices in the cabin and prohibiting their recharging on board the aircraft.
Recommendation(s)	Considering the ICAO EB 2014/074 AN 11/2.1, FAA SAFO 15003 and Addendum No. 1 to the 2015-2016 Edition of ICAO Doc 9284, EASA recommends aircraft operators to require passengers to carry e-cigarettes in the cabin, where

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an incident can be immediately mitigated, and not in their checked baggage, and to prohibit the recharging of e-cigarettes on board the aircraft.

Aircraft operators are encouraged to communicate their e-cigarette policy to passengers through any means already used to inform passengers about dangerous goods and related company policies.
